For the second year in a row, dozens of alums braved foul New England weather to gather at our annual Winter Gathering and Memorabilia Exposition. This year's event moved to a new venue at Smith Mills Church in Dartmouth, Massachusetts, and was an enjoyable time for us to get together, see some young and old familiar faces, and swap stories over our buffet lunch, all while surrounded by Cachalot and Scouting memorabilia.

As is becoming the norm with our events, we had several people among our attendees who we hadn't seen in a very long time-decades, in some cases; along with people brand-new to the Cachalot family. Our displays included camp patches, books and magazines, uniforms, rare flags, and other items from the prodigious collections of several of our members, as well as items for trade or sale from a few vendors as part of a Trade-o-ree, which was new to the agenda. Our own History Committee was on scene as well, to help answer questions and display photos and film from our growing collection.

One of the highlights of the day came courtesy of Bob Burbank, a new member of the Alumni Association who brought along both an assortment of old Cachalot patches as well

as an album of photos from one of his first years at Cachalot, 1948. These images, taken a mere two years after the camp opened, show a camp still under construction, as well as the boys who were out enjoying their summer, staying in tents not dramatically different than are used today.

We also got a surprise visit from a family whose home is on some of the land once occupied by Camp Noquochoke. They report that several buildings still stand, albeit in poor condition, and that

the swimming pool is now doing duty as a frog pond.

#### A Brief History Of...

# PRESCOTT HALL

At the top of "The Hill", with a great view of Five Mile Pond below, is a building that just about anyone who's ever spent a week of summer camp at Cachalot is sure to recognize—the Prescott Hall, our dining facility and more. Whether the occasion has been Sunday dinner, a Lodge Officer Training, a Klondike closing

ceremony, a crackerbarrel, or even the occasional floodedout Camp-o-ree, you've probably spent a little bit of time in the dining hall.

That is, provided you've been to camp since 1950. For the first 5 years of operation (1946-1950) there was no building to house the kitchen; instead, there was a collection of militarystyle canvas tents set up on wooden platforms for your dining convenience. Prescott Hall was completed iust in time for the 1951 season of summer camp, and was a big enough addition that it merited coverage in the New Bedford Standard-Times:

"Big news at Camp Cachalot is a newly-constructed mess hall; high upon the pine-studded hilltop over the waterfront. Completed just in time for the camp season, the structure resembles a large modern log cabin and is constructed of sturdy tight-grained wood." - Standard-Times, August 15th, 1951, p 13.

The article goes on to note that the kitchen had not yet been completed, as the Council was still

in the process of bringing electric power into camp. The electric service, and the kitchen, were expected to be complete in the fall.

The original structure was a bit smaller than today, a nearly L-shaped building with the kitchen at the end facing what is today the parking area.

It also hadn't been dubbed "Prescott Hall" just yet, and our research so far has failed to turn up exactly when that occurred, or what Prescott's first name was. There were two prominent individuals active in the Cachalot Council around the time the camp opened, William Prescott and Oliver Prescott, Jr. Both were on the Council's governing board in 1932, and were still noted in other documents as members of the Council in 1941 and 1942, although what their official capacity was is unclear.

The building escaped serious damage in the fire of 1964, but part of the reconstruction effort put money towards expanding the building. By the summer of 1966, the kitchen had been relocated to a new addition on the side of the building facing the road, and the old kitchen area was added on to, increasing the size of the dining area significantly. Later additions in the early 1990's and 2000's added a larger walk-in cooler and an expanded equipment storage area to the kitchen, respectively. Most recently, an covered outdoor dining area on the side facing Five Mile Pond was added, and is a popular dining spot in the summer.

There's long been a tradition of hanging plaques in the open rafters of Prescott Hall to memorialize your Troop's or Patrol's week at summer camp. Plaques currently hanging in the rafters date from the 1950s all the way through last summer, and feature everything from simple one-color wooden plaques listing the members of a unit all the way through elaborately painted, carved, and crafted masterpieces of wood, cloth, rope, and metal. Check out the pictures accompanying this article for one well-known example. In addition to all of the unit plaques,

the kitchen wall is a repository of many of the bronze plaques saved from Camp Noquochoke, and the underside of the roof sheathing is scrawled with the names of dozens of former kitchen staffers.

The building is currently in good condition, although there's always a little work to be done. The Alumni Association gave the building a fresh coat of stain in 2005, and that's holding up well. The window shutters will likely need some work in the next few years, and, unfortunately, the fireplace is all but unusable in its current condition (not that it ever stood a chance of warming

more that the people directly in front of it to begin with.) The ambience it once provided is missed.

This summer will mark Prescott Hall's 55th birthday, and as in summers past, it's sure to be used by Scouts and Scouters by the table-load, and filled to the rafters with song at least a few times every day. They'll dine on the finest Camp cuisine (it really is better than you remember it, not that it was ever that bad to begin with...), and listen to all those important announcements (announcements, announcements, please!) that come with a day in camp. At the end of their week some of them will even add a little bit more to the history of the place with their own plaques. Here's hoping it continues to be a center of fellowship for many more years to come!









Help us to identify the members of the 1970 Cachalot Summer Camp Staff!





# 2006 Summer Camp Staff Scholarship

Still seeking donations for this year's award

During Summer Camp 2006, we will be awarding our second scholarship to a member of the summer camp staff. The amount of this year's scholarship will be \$500. To be considered for the award, all applicants must:

- Serve on Camp Cachalot Summer Camp Staff the year the application is submitted.
- Hold a High School diploma and be attending college or other higher learning institution in the fall of the year the application is submitted.
- Have demonstrated leadership ability in Scouting and a strong record of participation in activities outside of Scouting.
- Deliver a completed application to the current Reservation Director no later than the end of the third week of Boy Scout Summer Camp.

Applications for the scholarship will be available at the beginning of summer camp from the Reservation Director. Applications will be reviewed by the Reservation Director and members of the Alumni Association's

Scholarship Committee to select the winning applicant. The winner will be notified prior to the conclusion of summer camp.

The scholarship program was quite successful in its first year, with over \$1000 raised and several staffers applying. This year, we are stiff far short of our goal of another \$1000 (remember that we try to raise both \$500 for the current year's scholarship and an additional \$500 to help establish a permanently endowed scholarship.
