

#### Were You There?

Remembering the "Big Fire" of 1964, Forty-Five Years Later

Plymouth, only stopping at White Island Pond

to the east of Cachalot. Thankfully, the Scouts

and Scouters are evacuated safely, and many

May 23rd, 1964: over seven hundred Scouts and Scouters participating in the spring Camporee at Camp Cachalot are told to evacuate the camp, which is in the path of a large forest fire. Over the course of the following two days, this fire destroys cottages at Charge Pond, sweeps into Cachalot from Myles Standish State Forest to the west, burning down much of the forest in camp and reducing several of camp's buildings to ash, jumps the

of the buildings at Camp survive. More than 800 firefighters and volunteers fight the fire, several of them injured in the process. Forty-five years later, Cachalot, and the region,

has recovered. New buildings have been built to replace the few that were lost. The forest throughout the camp now boasts trees even taller than the ones present when the fire struck. The Cachalot Alumni are dedicating this "anniversary" year of 2009 to preventing

another loss: the memories of the fire and of the way that Cachalot recovered from

We'll be discussing the fire at both our Winter Gathering (see below) and at Homecoming this year (watch the web site and the spring Cachaletter for details). We're also looking for people, Scouts or otherwise, who have first-hand memories of the fire and the years that followed, so we can record this "living history" for the Cachalot Scouts and Scouters of today and tomorrow. We know that there were over 1,500 people involved directly at the fire itself, either being evacuated or fighting the flames. Were you one of them? Do you know one of them?

If you were there, whether for the fire, fighting the fire, or as a volunteer working on restoration of the camp afterwards, we'd love to hear from you. If you have pictures or newspaper clippings from the fire or the restoration in the years right after, we'd like to see them. If you know someone who was there, let us know about them (or let them know about us!) Please, contact us via email at iwasthere@cachalotalumni.org, or send a letter to our surface mail address (on page 2), and we'll get back to you via telephone or whatever method is convenient for you.

It'd be a shame if we were to lose these valuable memories of what was one of the most significant events in Cachalot's history, so please, help us get the word out.

#### **New Ways to Stay In Touch**

Expanded Options for Getting Announcements and Sharing Your Memories

(Allow me to apologize in advance to our readers who don't "speak geek". But if you're an active computer user, or at least know what a "blog" is, read on. – The Editor)

Over the summer, we've added a few ways to make it easier to find out when our web site has new information, and to share your own memories with other Cachalot alums online.

First, we've begun sending out "tweets" using the Twitter service, even for the smaller updates to our web site that we haven't previously announced. Twitter is a "microblogging" service that lets people post very short (140 characters or less) messages that others can subscribe to. If you're a MySpace or a Facebook user, you can check up on Twitter users using applications right from that web site, and if you use an RSS reader you can read tweets like any other feed. Twitter users can just select the "follow" link on that page to get our tweets automatically.

Part of our purpose as an Association is to help enable Cachalot alumni to share their memories of Cachalot with one another. A lot of people have pictures of camp, so we thought that might be a good place to start. We've always had pictures of Cachalot up on the web site, but it hasn't really been possible for us to host everyone's photos--we've tried to focus on historic photos from our archives. This might change in the future, but as of now we've set up a group using the Flickr service, which is a free online photo service. Flickr (part of Yahoo!) is a photosharing service that lets people post their own photos, discuss them, and should allow us to show those photos on our web site as well (although I have a little more work to do to make that happen). Our hope is that our archive will continue to collect all the great, old photos of Cachalot, Noquochoke, and older Council events that people have shared with us, along with the new photos the Association is taking, and that the Flickr group will include all those other great shots that are being taken every day, whether it's great landscape shots you've taken or pictures of your most recent Troop outing at Camp.

Finally, we've added official "Camp Cachalot Alumni Association" groups on the social networking website Facebook and on the professional networking website LinkedIn. On Facebook in particular we'll be sending out invites to our events, so that's yet another way to keep up-to-date with what the Association is doing.

# Cachalot & Massasoit Districts Report

2008 is turning out to be a banner year for the Cachalot and Massasoit District. Both of the former Moby Dick Districts are showing growth in membership. Massasoit is leading the Council with 43 more youth this year than last and has started 5 new units (Pack, Troop or Crew) for a total of 38 units. Cachalot is showing its first year of membership growth in over 5 years with 14 more youth this year and 3 new units including a second Sea Scout Ship (45 units to date). Cachalot continues to try to reach more kids with the program by starting another 4 units before the end of December. Together these districts boast 1581 Scouts. Massasoit also led the council in the largest dollar amount increase for their popcorn sale! Cachalot could still use some help with theirs.

But what did all these Scouts do? 25 advanced to the rank of Eagle. The Cachalot District awarded the Boy Scout Medal of Merit to a Cub Scout for helping a neighbor who had a fire in their house. The Klondike Derby, attended by both Districts, had over 30 sleds compete this with the Webelos Division returning to this event (THANK YOU to the alumni for manning the hot chocolate station). MASSJAM happened this year with over 130 youth from both districts and believe it or not, it did not rain. Each district ran its own Pinewood Derby with well over 120 Cub Scouts competing. Our partnership with the Buttonwood Park Zoo continues to grow as Cub Scouts and their families attend Pin and Belt Loop days and sleep overnight there. Day Camp, run both at Cachalot and the Fall River Rod and Gun Club, had over 140 Cubs in attendance run entirely by volunteers. Cachalot overnight had 284 Scouts from both Districts. Venturers from around New England took part in a Shooting Sports day sponsored by the local crews at the New Bedford Rod and Gun Club this spring.

Both districts have made great strides in finding leadership on the both the unit and district levels, but could always use more help. Fernando Garcia, of Fall River Ford, has agreed to sign on as the Chairman of the Massasoit District, while Bill M. Whelan, of Whelan Associates, continues to skillfully lead the Cachalot District. Robert Dorgan of Pack and Troop 52 Fairhaven and Jack Staskiewicz, Massasoit District Commissioner, were the recipients of the council's highest award, the Silver Beaver.

Thank you to all the alumni that continue to support the local Scouting program by giving of their time and/or FOS dollars to keep the tradition alive. 2010 will be the Boy Scout's of America's Centennial year, and both the Cachalot and Massasoit Districts are poised to enter the next 100 years strong.

## A Brief History Of...

A Little Peek Behind the Scenes

One of the things our History Committee has spent a lot of time doing is scanning photos to be preserved, and later doing work to restore the images and clean up scratches and other defects. Just scanning the photos can be a lot of work, as some of the photos are quite old, and in some cases very delicate. We thought that it'd be interesting to show you some of the work that goes into the pictures we're archiving, in this case a batch of slides salvaged from the old Moby Dick Council offices in New Bedford containing most of the 1948 Summer Camp promotions pictures.


We received the slides in a metal box along with the original, hand-typed sheet describing each shot (see the picture on the right.) These slides are old "120 format" slides, the same medium-sized format shot by the Kodak Brownie camera. They are roughly 2.75" square pieces of slide film sandwiched between two thin pieces of glass, taped all around the outside with a foil tape. Each slide had a small piece of red tape affixed to it with a hand-written number. The glass was dirty, scratched, and in some cases broken, and the numbers were difficult to read, but the mounts had done their job: aside from fading, the glass had taken the brunt of the damage over the years and the slide film itself was in pretty good condition. An example of what the slides looked like can be seen in the photo to the right.


Because the mounts were in such poor condition, and also because 120 format adapters for slide scanners are outside our budget, we decided to un-mount the slides in order to scan them. This would also give us the opportunity to examine the film itself for damage and do some minor cleaning before scanning them. This involves very carefully cutting the foil tape with a sharp utility knife where the two pieces of slide glass come together, carefully extracting the film, and then cleaning the surface by blowing air on it and possibly lightly brushing the side of the film without the film emulsion on it to clean off any deposits.

Once cleaned, the film is mounted on the film carrier for the film scanner (top photo, opposite), scanned and roughly color-corrected to help reduce the effect of fading (middle photos, opposite), then stored in non-reactive mylar sleeves to await new glass mounts (bottom photo, opposite). Any photo restoration happens to a copy of the digital source we scanned in. Scanning alone takes 15-20 minutes per slide, and restoration several hours per slide.

While we haven't finished restoring all of these slides, we've done some clean-up, and those images can be found on our web site in the "1948 Summer Camp Photos" gallery. Check them out at www.cachalotalumni.org!

The \$250 Cachalot Alumni Staff Scholarship was presented to Zachary M. Card, also of Carver and also a member of Troop 48. A June 2008 graduate of Old Colony Regional Vocational Technical High School, he is a

freshman at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. He was the Archery Director for the 2008 summer camp season, his fifth year on staff.

Both of these young men have served as excellent examples and role models to the Scouts attending Cachalot in their time on staff, and the Association extends it's congratulations to Paul, Zach, and their parents.
