The History of the Order of the Arrow in Narragansett Council to Highlight Our 2013 Winter Gathering

The Order of the Arrow, Scouting's "Honor Society", was founded by E. Urner Goodman and Carroll A. Edson at Treasure Valley Scout Reservation in 1915 as the *Wimachtendienk* program. In 1938, the Fall River Council formed Noquochoke Lodge 124, which has become, after multiple mergers of local councils and lodges, the modern-day Abnaki Lodge 102 of the Narragansett Council. 2013 will mark

the 75th anniversary of the Order of the Arrow in our area, and the Abnaki Lodge has been spending considerable time and effort to document the history of the various lodges that combined to create it.

So, on January 26th, 2013, starting at 11:00_{AM}, representatives from the lodge will be on-hand at our annual Winter Gathering to talk about the history of

the Order of the Arrow locally, and show off the memorabilia and artifacts they've collected that help make up the physical history of the lodge. We know many of our Association have been very active in the Order of the Arrow over the years, and we count multiple past Chiefs among our membership, so we hope people will stop in and help share their own memories of their time in the OA, whether that's a story about getting their arrow "notched"

during their Ordeal, the most clever way they disguised their script for a ceremony, or even their favorite "fellowship weekend" service project at camp.

The Gathering this year will take place at Our Lady of Grace Parish Hall at 569 Sanford Road in Westport, Massachusetts. We'll get started at 11:00 AM, with some time set aside to catch

up with old friends as you arrive and check out some of the ephemera collected by the Lodge and the Association. Lunch will be available at noon, followed by a quick update on what the Association has been up to and what's coming up in the near future, capped with the Lodge's presentation as our main event. Things should wrap up by 3:00PM.

As with our other events, our Winter Gathering is free to attend. Lunch is also free, although we appreciate a small donation to help us defray the costs of the meal (\$5 suggested) if you partake. Nominations Sought for This Year's Wall of Fame Ballot

Very soon after the first of the year, we will begin the process of putting together the ballot for this year's Wall of Fame voting, and as always, we rely on the nominations put together by our members to find those people most deserving of a spot on the Wall of Fame. fill it out as completely as you can, and get those nominations back to us. Remember that this year, nominees must have had their first involvement with Cachalot in 1992 or earlier, and have significant contributions in one or more of the following categories:

Service - nominations for Service are intended to recognize those people who have volunteered their own time and effort to provide physical service to camp to help improve the facility. For example, nominees in the Service category may have helped build and maintain buildings; helped with conservation efforts by planting trees or clearing campsites, helped to keep camp vehicles up and running, and so on.

Program - nominations for Program should recognize those volunteers who have helped to provide excellent programs for Scouts and Scouters at camp, whether it be by creating, organizing, or helping conduct events at camp, preserving the campfire traditions at Cachalot, or teaching and training Scouts and Scouters.

Professional - nominees in the Professional category would include any employee of the council or the Boy Scouts of America as a whole who have gone above and beyond the requirements of their job in the service of Camp Cachalot. This includes Scouting professional and office staff, Rangers, and members of the summer camp staff.

Financial - nominations in this category should be for those people and organizations who have made significant financial contributions expressly for Camp Cachalot. This category is not intended to recognize those large financial contributors to Scouting or to the council more generally, but rather those contributions with a direct, intentional, lasting impact on Camp Cachalot itself.

Nominations must be submitted before April 15th, 2013 for consideration for this year's ballot.



Landscaping With Native Plants at the Wall of Fame Gardens

By now many have you have seen the wall created by the alumni association to honor those who have given greatly of themselves for the benefit if Cachalot. Great thought and deliberation went into the design of the wall and the improved Bill Joyce Flag Field. Every element has meaning and the wall, as currently built, can accommodate several decades of future honorees. When visiting the wall you may have also notice the flower gardens planted around the wall. These flowers, like everything else about the wall, were chosen carefully.

As the construction of the wall neared completion the Wall of Fame committee turned their attention to the finishing touches. After weighing many options the committee settled on pine needles as a ground covering as the best choice. Once spread over the flag pole field, it was the clear that the committee made the right decision. The pine needles created a natural feel that tied the new construction into the surrounding hillside. Best of all, the pine needles were free and more will be added every autumn by the surrounding pitch pines.

Not to break with the careful planning that began this project, the committee decided that the plants used in these gardens should be native. Native plants (or animals) are those that naturally occur in a geographic area. Native plants offer several benefits over exotic species. Native plants provide food and shelter to local wildlife. Bees were buzzing over our native blooms within minutes of planting. A hummingbird was sipping nectar within the hour.


The new gardens include black-eyed Susans (Rudbeckia fulgida), purple coneflower (Echinacea purpurea), cardinal flower (Lobelia cardinalis), New England aster (Aster novaangliae), butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa) and great blue Lobelia (Lobelia siphilitica). However, the most surprising and interesting plant in the Wall of Fame gardens is Opuntia humifusa; the eastern prickly pear cactus. That's right; a native New England cactus! The eastern prickly pear is at the northeast limits of its range in Massachusetts and, as you may have guessed, is found only is habitats with very sandy soils. The known Massachusetts populations occur on Nantucket and the outer Cape, however there is an old (pre-1978) record from the southern Connecticut Valley. Its local rarity ranks it as a "species of special concern" by the Natural Heritage/Endangered Species Program of the Massachusetts Division of Fisheries and Wildlife.

Our prickly pears do not look like much at the time of this writing, but they will mature into plants that are two to three feet across. Hummingbirds and butterflies will be attracted to the large, trumpet-shaped, yellow flowers this cactus produces in the spring. The red fruits, produced in the late summer, are sweet and edible—if you can beat the wildlife to them. Eastern prickly pear does not typically have large, obvious spine. Instead, it has very small, reddish-brown, barbed bristles which will stick into unwary fingers. And they will hurt!

All of the plants in these gardens (to date) are perennial and will grow to fill in the Wall of Fame Gardens. Over time we will be able to split these plants for use in conservation projects around camp; particularly erosion control. We will also continue to add to add new species of native plants in order to extend the "flowering season" (now mostly restricted to late summer) as well as increase the education value to Cachalot scouts, and ecological value to the local wildlife.

Obviously, the pictures lose a little in a black and white publication like the Cachaletter. We've used an assortment of Creative Commonslicenced photos here—to check out the originals, we've put the web addresses (and QR codes scannable by many smartphones) for the original photos at the bottom of the opposite page.
