Held annually ever since,

A Wish For Things That Work

Here it is! I know you have all been waiting for it. I give you the Cachalot Wish List 2011!

- An anvil
- An electric motor for one of the Sea Nymph row boats.
- Game cameras: camouflaged, motion activated, with web capability.
- A concrete tube or plastic culvert section at least 10" long and 3"- 5" in diameter. Planning a project to replace land bridge to protect lagoon habitat.
- Telephone poles.
- Large plastic barrels for new composting program. 55 gallon or larger.
- Hand tools
- Chisels, gouges, riving tool, wood rasps. All shapes and sizes.
- Display cases: any size or shape. (can be placed on top of a table, glass front/top counter, or glass front cabinet/bookcase)
- Nature specimens: Skeletons, pelts, taxidermy, insect displays, plant life displays. Fish tanks.
- Redone or new display or demo items for any of our merit badge classes that we run during Summer Camp. (i.e. knot boards, wood species and examples of their uses for wood-working, leaf identification, animal track castings, scat chart... without the actual scat please, camp gadgets)
- Spars: long, many.
- Saw mill leftovers: when the tree is sawn for boards the outer edge is left. If a mill would be willing to give us some of this I can use it to make some rustic trim and accents.
- Big tree trunk. Pine at least 18" diameter and as long as possible.
- Transportation for a very large tree trunk if one is donated.
- Steel pipe: 4" to 6" diameter. Any length. A 12' footer would be good.

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Vic Sylvia, Association Chairman

As I look back on the many years spent at Camp Cachalot, I find myself reflecting on the changes that have taken place over those years. Some changes have been due to acts of nature and others have been due to the planning of others. Nob Hill and Sleepy Hollow have been erased due to the fire of '64 and replaced by Cohakett, Sconticut, Agawam and Acooshnet, then changed to sites 1,2,3,4 and 5, then back to Cohakett, Sconticut, Agawam and Acooshnet. In my youth, the Trading Post was located at the old Commissioner Shack by the lagoon. A new building was built after the fire of '64 by Tom Cullen Field, and the Trading Post was moved to it. When that building burned down in a fire back in the '80s it was moved back to the Commissioner Shack. It stayed there until a new building was built at the site of the one that burnt down. It has since been moved to the Fox's Den, which itself had been converted from the old camp shower house.

Program areas have moved from one location to another, with the exception of the Rifle Range, although I can remember two or three restoration projects on the decking and roof. The Nature area when I first attended Summer Camp was located by the pond, then moved to the Boat House, then to the old Pump House by the lagoon, then to the new Trading Post which replaced the one that burnt down, back to the lagoon and then to the Boat House where it currently resides. Five Mile Pond has remained the same, although I swear it was twice as big as it is now. The waterfront area has changed several times over the years. In my youth the dock system was made of aluminum and was very slippery, which prompted the area director to warn us that if we fell and got cut by the aluminum, we could die from

The next few years will see the Association taking a more active role in the future of camp. aluminum dioxide poisoning. I don't think anyone died, but I do remember Steve Moniz banging his head against the dock and cutting it back in '62, funny but I haven't seen him since. A new docking system was constructed which required volunteers to remove it on Labor Day weekends and reinstall it in place on Memorial Day weekends. Those were replaced, thank God, by the new system that can stay in place all year, although the decking was replaced by the Association a few years back.

The Boat House is in the process of change with a portion being developed as a Welcome Center and museum. The Dining Hall has grown over the years with additions, walk- in freezer and a deck area overlooking the pond and is in the beginning stages of a complete major renovation. I know that the hill leading to the Dining Hall has become a lot steeper and the distance from the parking area to the Old Trading Post/Handicraft area/Noquochoke Lodge has increased by at least one half mile. But change is good, and I look forward to what we as an Association can do to improve Cachalot.

The next few years will see the Association taking a more active role in the future of camp. We will be participating in Camp promotions and assisting in the improvements to the program areas of Summer Camp, along with sponsoring a work weekend. All we need is your help. Project committee chairman Duane Houghton and several other alumni have spent most of the weekends since re-sculpting the slope, terracing in steps and parade fields with blocks, and setting the posts that will be the main structure of the Wall of Fame. They've been making great progress, and everything looks fantastic so far. Many thanks to Duane, Dave Houghton, Ash Houghton, Darin Young, Darryl Higgins, Bill Begin, Troops 55 and 70, Tim Connick, Vic Sylvia, and Karrie Dumais for all the work they've done.
